STANDING ORDER

WHEREAS before the Court is the application and request by Jonah Berger for exemption from the fees imposed by the Electronic Public Access fee schedule adopted by the Judicial Conference of the United States Courts;

WHEREAS the Court finds that Jonah Berger, a professor at the University of Pennsylvania who studies the effects of language, falls within the class of users listed in the fee schedule as being eligible for a fee exemption;

WHEREAS Jonah Berger has demonstrated that an exemption is necessary in order to avoid unreasonable burdens and to promote public access to information;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT Jonah Berger shall be exempt from the payment of fees for access via PACER to the electronic case files maintained in this court, to the extent such use is incurred to study how the language lawyers use impacts the decisions juries reach;

IT IS ALSO ORDERED THAT Jonah Berger shall not be exempt from the payment of fees incurred in connection with other uses of the PACER system in this court. Additionally, the following limitations apply:

- 1. this fee exemption applies only to Jonah Berger (PACER Account #6710677) and is valid only for the purposes stated above;
- 2. this fee exemption applies only to the electronic case files of this court that are available through the PACER system;
- 3. by accepting this exemption, Jonah Berger agrees not to sell for profit any data obtained as a result of receiving this exemption;
- 4. Jonah Berger is prohibited from transferring any data obtained as a result of receiving this exemption, including redistribution via Internet based databases;
- 5. this exemption is valid until March 26, 2022.

This exemption may be revoked at the discretion of the Court at any time. A copy of this Order shall be sent to the PACER Service Center.
